



Annual Report 2009-10

During the 2009-10 financial year, Leichhardt Women's Community Health Centre provided multi-disciplinary, wholistic women's health care on over 20,311 occasions to women, most of whom were living in Sydney's inner west and experiencing financial disadvantage.

Our Vision

LWCHC is actively committed to the rights of all women to access quality health care and to the realisation of better health outcomes for women.

The centre does this by providing traditional and complementary health services which are of a preventative and curative nature, designed and delivered in an integrated way to improve the quality of life of women.

We believe:

- All women deserve to be treated with dignity and respect
- Women's racial, cultural and lifestyle diversity deserve respect in accordance with basic human rights
- In women's ability to define their own health needs
- In women's rights to make informed choices about their health management
- In women's ability to participate and take responsibility for their own well being
- In a client-centred approach to health care which is non-labelling, non-pathologising and respects women's stories
- In respecting the privacy of women seeking services
- Health and wellbeing is enhanced by trusting professional relationships and the provision of a safe and friendly environment
- Women's health status is improved through advocacy and social change strategies at State and Federal levels
- Information, consultation, advocacy and community development are important elements in the health process
- Health promotion, disease prevention and strengthening the primary health system are as important as providing high quality illness treatment services.

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Funding

LWCHC is a non-government and not for profit women's health service run by women, for women. NSW Health provides the majority of the funding, which is administered by Sydney South West Area Health Service. The centre has five funding programs, three from the NSW NGO grant program: women's health, drug and alcohol and HIV. Medicare bulk-billing funds the doctors' clinics and a smaller amount is received from donations and sales.

The centre is funded to focus on women experiencing financial disadvantage and in recent years, private funding from donations has greatly enhanced the centre's ability in this regard.

The centre's multi-disciplinary, wholistic approach to health care takes the 'whole' woman and her life circumstances into account, while the safe, knowledge-rich environment aims to encourage women to make informed health care decisions and to be empowered to live full, healthy lives.

Payment details

Doctors services are bulk-billed to Medicare (clients: bring your Medicare card with you)

Naturopathy, acupuncture, drug and alcohol counselling are provided to women on low income.

Naturopathy will cost between \$20-\$70 depending on the prescription.

Health education is provided by donation.

We appreciate a contribution of \$10 (or \$5 concession) each time a woman visits us. This helps with the centre's running costs.

Leichhardt Women's Community Health Centre is one of 21 women's health centres in NSW. The Leichhardt centre was the first women's health centre established in Australia and the NSW women's health centres have supported women's health and wellbeing for over 36 years.

Women's Health Centres lead the way in the development of new approaches to health care for women, which take into account the social determinants of health and the need for women to be involved in the management of their own health. (Source: NSW Health Women's Health Plan 2010)

Encouraging students to learn

In 2009-10 the centre hosted 12 tertiary students on placement and 54 students attended talks to learn about the centre and the social model of health.

All students are surveyed for satisfaction and to gauge the extent of their new knowledge.

- 100% learnt new information
- 91.5% were confident they could apply the new information
- 97% were completely or very satisfied with the placement or session.

Students were from University of Western Sydney, Ultimo TAFE, University of NSW, Sydney University, University of Technology Sydney and ACAP.

Students are studying a range of disciplines including nursing, medicine, nursing, social work, counselling, naturopathy, welfare and dance therapy..

Income

Only 9% of clients identifying their employment status were in full time employment.

Location

88% of all clients in 2009-10 lived in Sydney South West Area Health Service. The remainder mainly came from Sydney's eastern and northern suburbs where there is no comparable NGO women's health centre. The women accessing the Women Partners of Bisexual Men Service came from all over Sydney, NSW and even interstate.

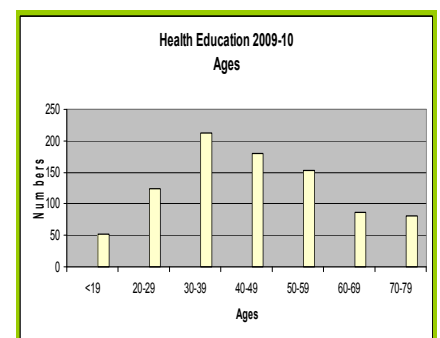
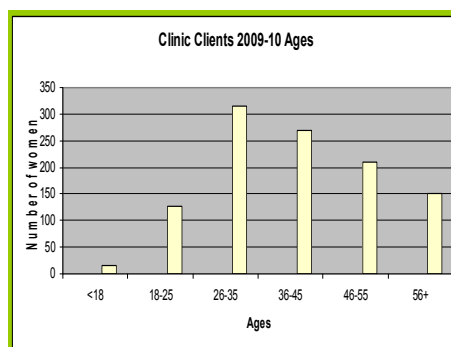
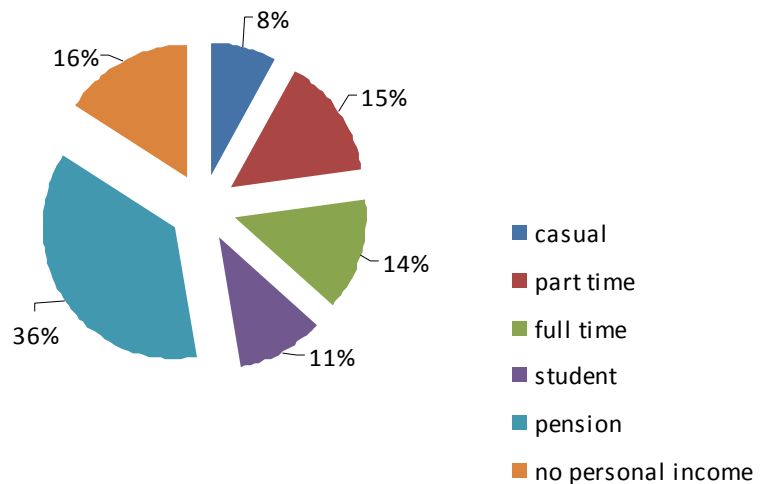
Ethnicity

38% of total clients were Australian, 4% of total clients identified as Indigenous, 51% identified as CALD, 7% came from other English speaking countries.

Age

Currently the data base and the health education sessions have been reported in different age groupings. The middle age groups are the highest. Over the past few years the number of women in their teens has been increasing. From next year, ages across all clinics, counselling and health education will be recorded in a consistent way.

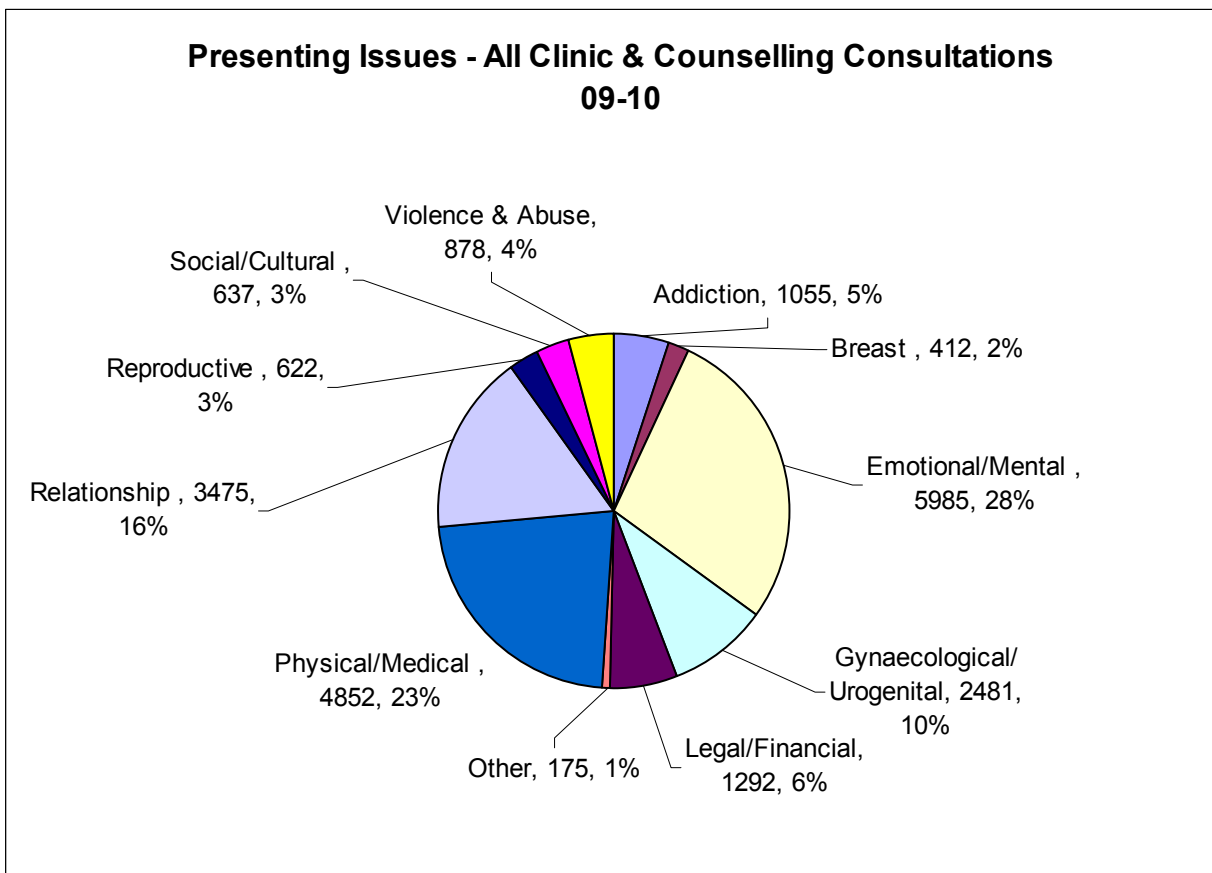

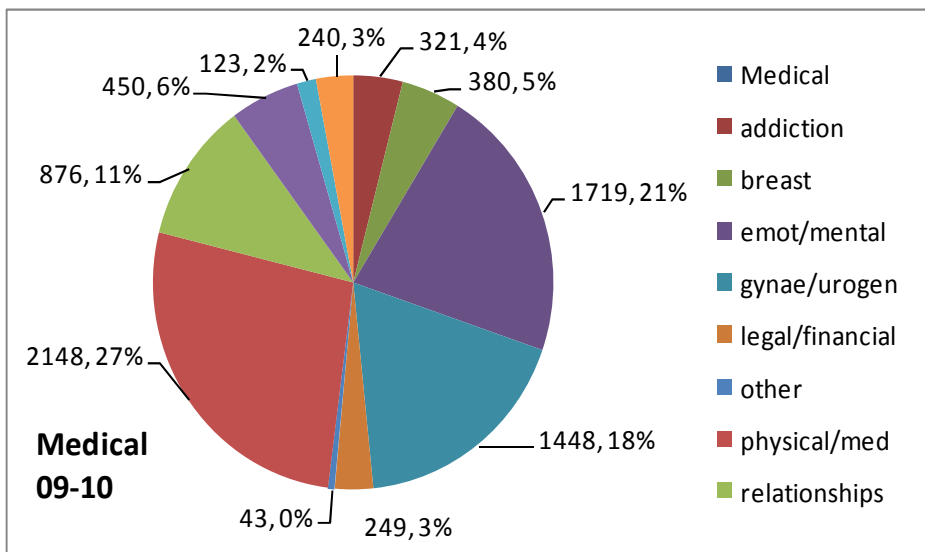

Medical Clinics

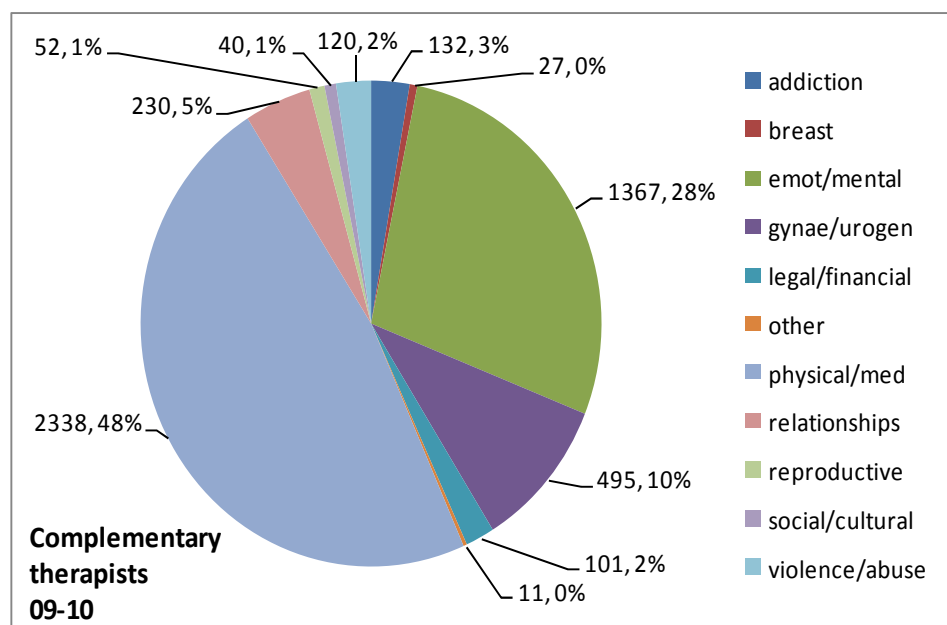
The medical clinics had 1474 appointments (1136 appointments for the [general practitioners](#) and 338 for the [nurse](#)). The highest presenting issues for the doctors were depression (323 occasions), anxiety (287 occasions), self esteem issues (262 occasions), pap/cervical screening (222 occasions), stress (177), sexually transmitted infections (166), menstruation (167), relationships (142), disordered eating (138) and gastrointestinal health issues (108).

As well as working from the Centre in Leichhardt, the nurse saw 213 appointments with women in outreach clinics in Campsie, Marrickville, Belmore and Leichhardt. The highest presenting issues during the year for the nurse were pap/cervical screening (209), urinary continence (187), breast health (169), relationships (131), contraception (129), safe sex and sexually transmitted infection (102), menopause (75).



Complementary therapies

Women attended 646 appointments for [acupuncture](#) and 385 appointments for [naturopathy/homeopathy](#). The highest presenting issues in acupuncture clinics were stress (243 occasions of service), chronic pain (215 occasions of service), depression (133 occasions), sleep issues (132), menstruation (99), anxiety/panic (83) and respiratory health (63 occasions). The highest issues presenting for the Centre's naturopaths were digestion (157), depression (159), anxiety/panic (157), stress (214), sleep issues (109), fatigue (105), nutrition (119) and self esteem ((80).

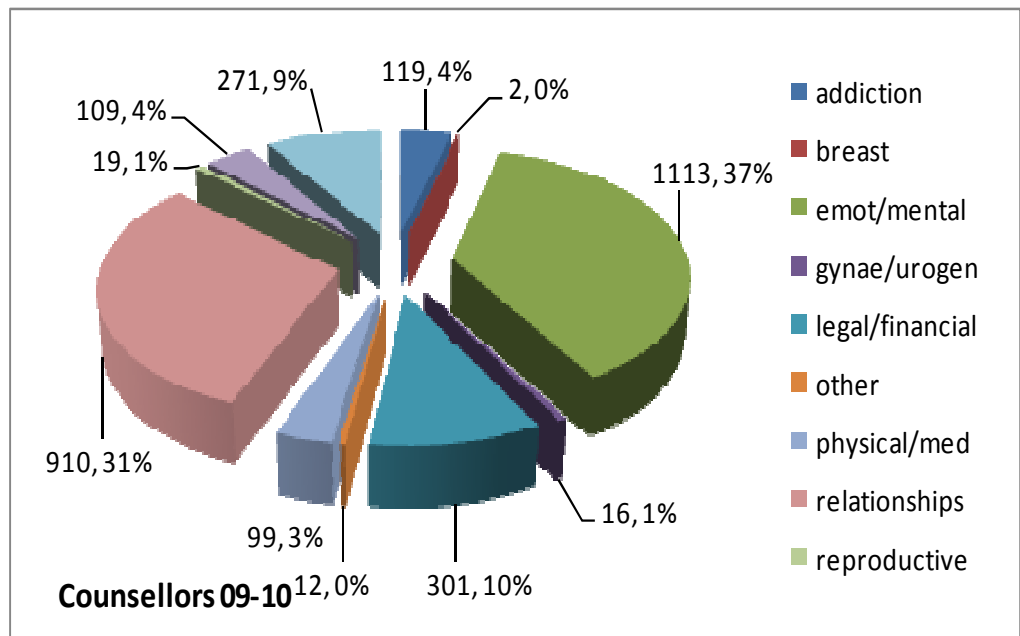


Counselling

Several staff at the centre provide counselling, including the women's health nurse, CALD health educators, and occasionally the front desk. However, actual counselling services at LWCHC are the general assessment and referral counselling; alcohol, tobacco and other drugs counselling; the counselling for women partners of same sex attracted men. Counselling for women dealing with domestic violence, the program for adult survivors of childhood sexual assault (in partnership with NSW Rape Crisis Centre) and the Centre's visiting psychologist who's registered with Medicare and Victims Compensation.

Information from the data base reflects the counselling from the general assessment and referral counselling; alcohol, tobacco and other drugs counselling and counselling by the Women Partners of Bisexual Men Service.

The highest presenting issues in counselling for 2009-10 were relationships (248 occasions of service), family issues (194 occasions), stress (190), domestic violence (161), grief and loss (154 occasions), emotional trauma (146), parenting (144), anxiety (144) and depression (128).



Counselling for women who've experienced or are experiencing domestic violence ...

Our heart felt thanks to Kristin Dawson. Kristin has been providing counselling for women experiencing domestic violence through a partnership with LWCHC for the past two years. Unfortunately Kristin has had to leave us to pursue other interests. Kristin's experience in working with domestic violence and her knowledge around all the issues has been a benefit to the centre and of course to the clients she's been able to support and assist to new lives.

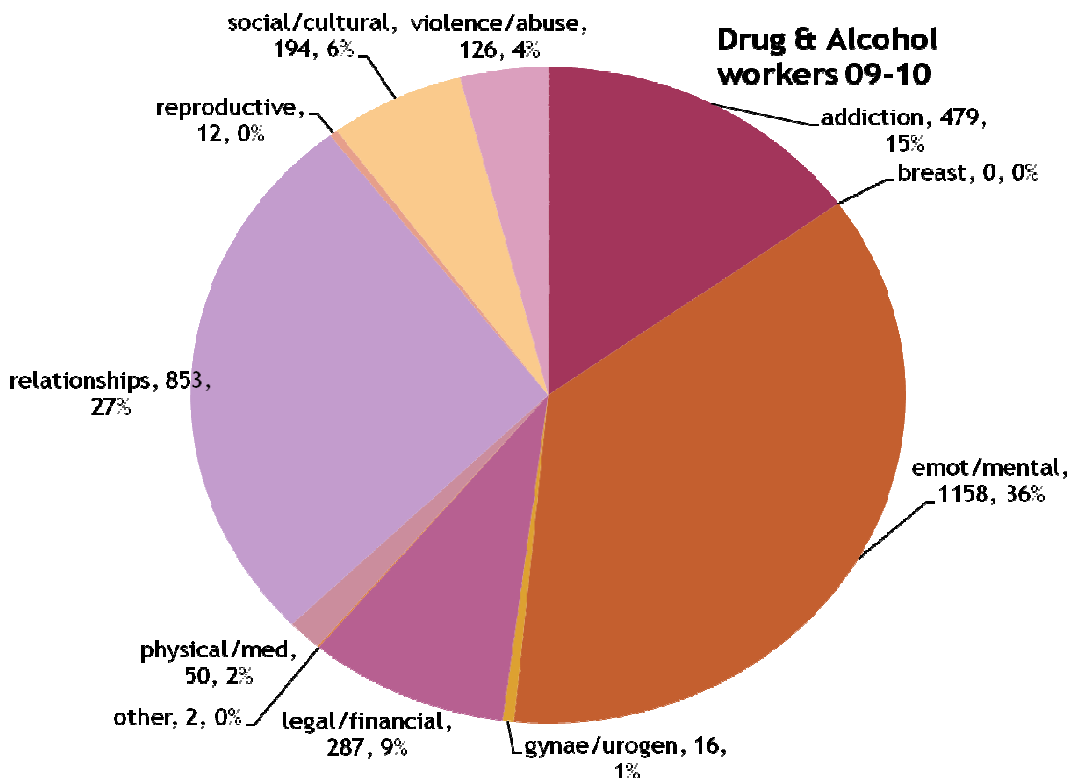


Adult Survivors of Childhood Sexual Assault ...

The centre's ability to provide services to women who've experienced sexual assault as children has been enhanced by a partnership with NSW Rape Crisis. All staff at Leichhardt are experienced in working sensitively with the issues of childhood sexual assault. During the year, women raised having experienced childhood sexual abuse on 180 occasions. The partnership with NSW Rape Crisis Centre has enabled a further 24 women to engage in regular counselling this year.

Alcohol, Tobacco & Other Drugs Service

The Alcohol, tobacco and other drugs workers had a total of 307 face to face counselling sessions during the year. 117 women attended three groups, six talks and one information night and 107 people attended two health promotion events. 92% of counselling clients surveyed reported an increased awareness of harm reduction principles and 90% of clients surveyed at the conclusion of their counselling contract reported increased self esteem as a result of the counselling. Other than substance use issues, the highest presenting issues for ATOD counselling were relationships (254), anxiety (234 occasions), family issues (194 occasions), self esteem (237), family issues (194), childhood issues (151), stress (162), loneliness and isolation (149), parenting (137).

Health Education

This year a total of 1403 women attended health education sessions.

33 groups and workshops and 56 talks were conducted by women's health funded staff (the health educators and the women's health nurse, naturopath and health promotion officer); Alcohol, Tobacco and Other drugs workers conducted three groups, six talks, one information night and 92 women partners of gay and bisexual men attended support groups and an annual get together in Sydney.

Health education aims to improve women's health physically and emotionally and to build social connections and personal resilience. Groups centre around issues such as recognising and early prevention of depression, recognising healthy and unhealthy relationships, building self esteem, maintaining good cardiovascular health, protecting against obesity, reducing tobacco use, being well in pregnancy and childbirth education.

Groups conducted in 2009-10 included Making Changes in Recovery, Relaxation, Meditation, Breathing for Vitality, Healing Qigong, Healthy Body Image, Communicating for Healthy Relationships, Chinese Women Growing Older, Parenting Between Cultures, Expressive Movement & Dance, New Mums' Walking Group, Leichhardt Women's Walkers and Vietnamese Women's Support groups in Marrickville and Glebe.

How women hear about us

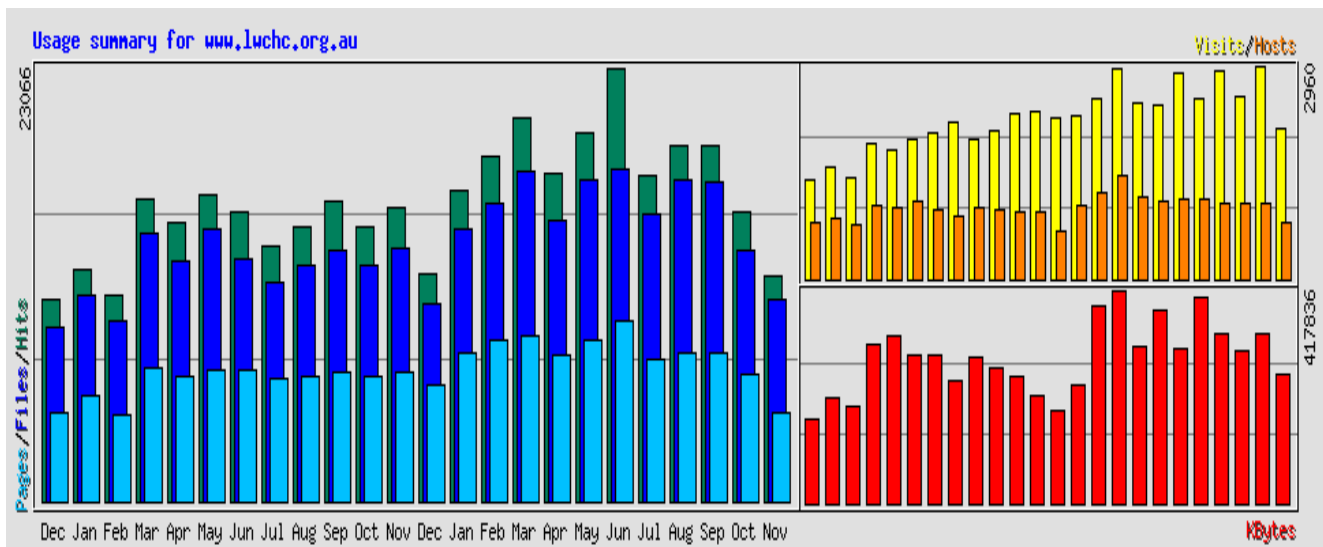
The centre has partnerships with an estimated 141 other health services, community organisations and practitioners. On their initial intake forms and in surveys women consistently report that they've been referred from these organisations which include local doctors, family support services, Department of Community Services, local hospitals, sexual assault services, domestic violence services, and Centrelink to name a few.

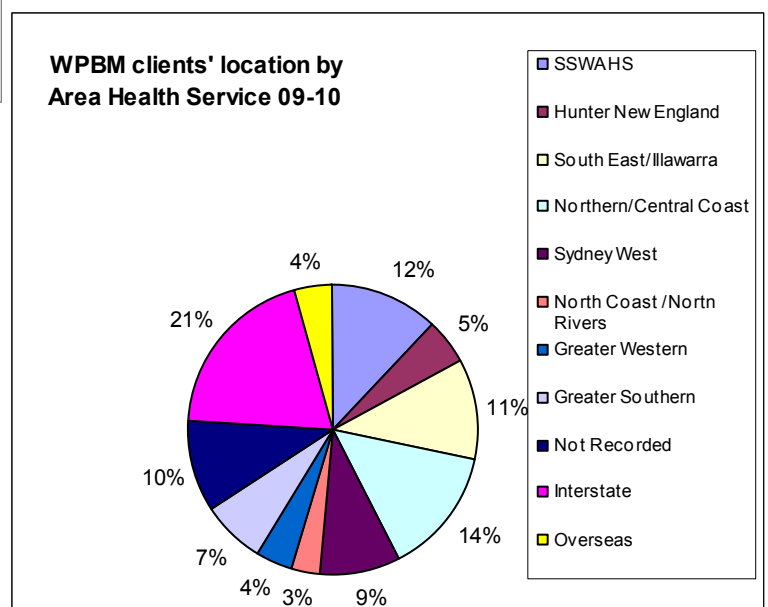
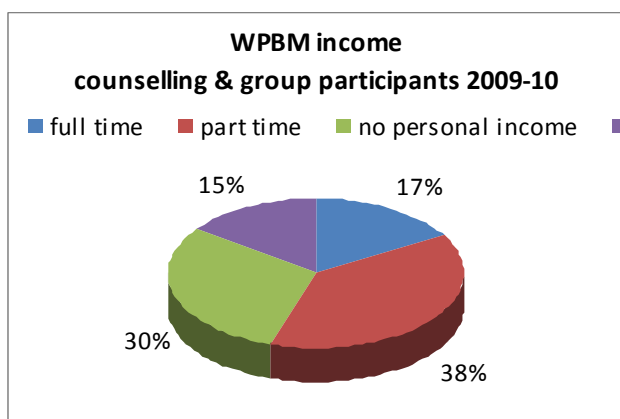
the high level of demand of the previous year. Women from all over NSW continued to contact the service asking for information, support and counselling, and this year, numbers of women from all around Australia also continued.

Groups are convened according to client demand depending on how many women are ready, wanting a group, within commuting distance of Sydney and able to attend.

This year, staff presented a paper at the 6th Australian Women's Health Conference in Hobart highlighting this is the only government funded service of its kind in Australia and expressing the need for similarly funded services in each Australian state.

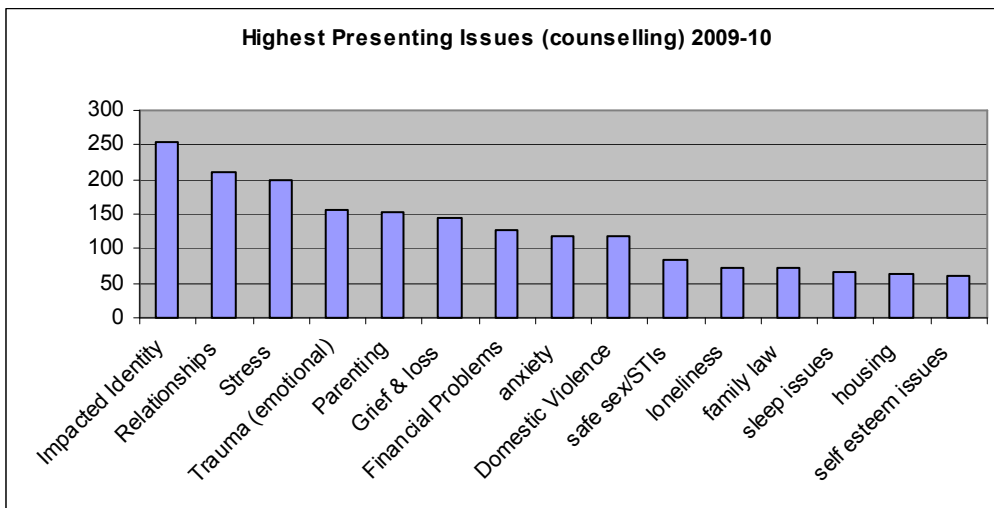

Women & HIV Capacity Building Project

In 2008 the Centre applied for funding to enhance the Centre's capacity to respond to women at risk of HIV and other sexually transmitted infections.

This year we learnt the funding submission had been successful. After negotiations with Sydney South West Area Health Service and fine-tuning with project partners, the project will consist of developing resource material including a DVD and a training package to increase the awareness of existing service providers in NSW to women in the population groups at higher risk of HIV. Project partners include the Positive Heterosexual Service NSW, NSW Multicultural Disability Advocacy Service, Sex Workers Outreach Project, NSW Users and AIDS Association and Central Sydney General Practice Network.

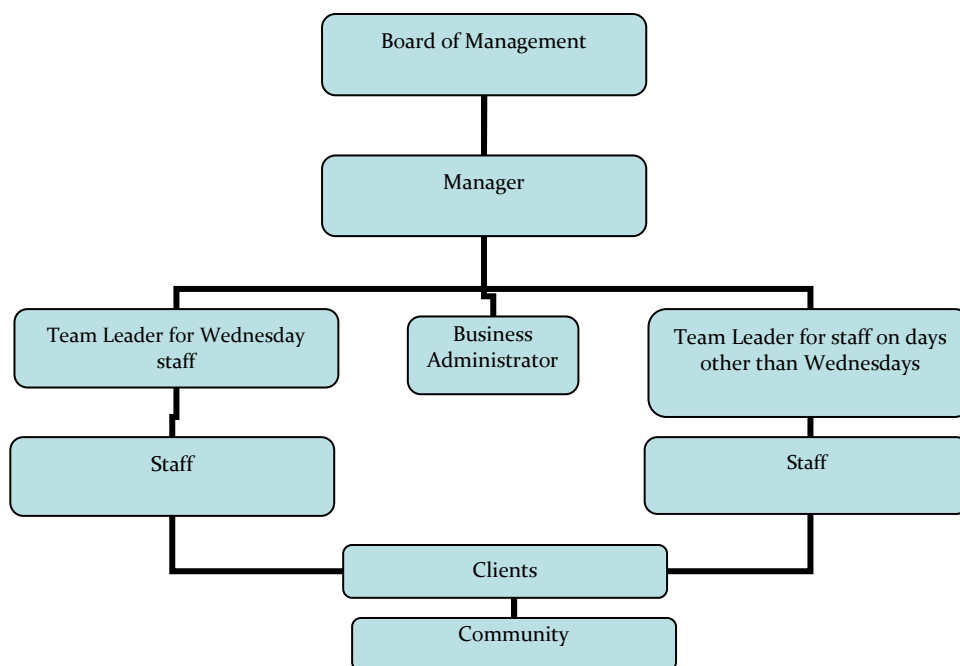
Leichhardt Women’s Community Health Centre is an incorporated association managed by a Board of Management with eight members, comprising six women elected from the community and two staff.
